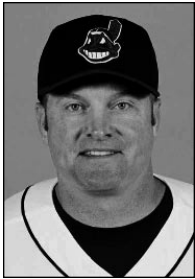

Managerial/Coaching Career

Eric enters his 5th season as the Manager of the Cleveland Indians...Led the Indians to the 8th highest win total in franchise history in 2005, posting a record of 93-69 (.574), the 6th best record in Major League Baseball... That season the Indians posted the best record in MLB from July 31st thru the end of the season (39-18) and following the season Wedge was the runner-up in the AL BBWAA *Manager of the Year* voting and has placed in the voting in each of his three years of service with the Indians...During the first three years of his tenure the Indians posted consecutive seasons of double-digit win increase totals from 2003-05 (68 wins, 80 wins, 93 wins)...The last time the Indians enjoyed that type of improvement was from 1946-48...The 25-game two-year win improvement total from 2003-05 was 2nd in MLB over the span...In 2006 the Indians went 78-84 (.481), finished in 4th place in the AL Central and were 31-20 from August 9th thru the end of the season with a team that finished up the season with 17 rookies...Wedge now owns a 4-year Major League managerial record of 319-329 (.492)...His career managerial record at the professional level is 710-644 (.524)...Managed his second full season for the Tribe in 2004 as he led the club to their biggest single season improvement in terms of wins since 1991 and 1992...Finished 6th in the 2004 AL *Manager of the Year* voting (80-82, 3rd place, 6th best improvement over previous year in MLB)...Was named 39th manager of the Cleveland Indians on October 29, 2002...Compiled a record 68-94 (.420) in his first season managing in the big leagues (managed 25 rookies in all during the 2003 season)...Guided the Indians to a record of 55-56 (.495) from May 1 to September 1...For his efforts Wedge received votes in the 2003 BBWAA AL *Manager of the Year* voting (8th place)...Managed in the Cleveland Indians Player Development system for five seasons from 1998-2002, compiling a record of 391-315 (.554) over the span...He managed the AAA Buffalo Bisons for two seasons in 2001-02, guiding the Bisons to consecutive appearances in the International League playoffs as his .622 (178-108) career winning percentage at Buffalo is the highest in franchise history (since 1877) among managers with more than one season at the helm...In 2002 he led the Bisons to a record of 87-57 (.604) losing in the International League finals...After the season he was named The Sporting News Minor League Manager of the Year...In 2001 he piloted the Bisons to a modern-day franchise record 91 wins (91-51, .644) and was later named *International League Manager of the Year* and *Baseball America Triple A Manager of the Year* in 2001...He began his managerial career in 1998 at Class A Columbus (59-81) of the South Atlantic League after concluding his playing career in 1997...He guided the A Kinston Indians in 1999 (79-58) to a spot in the Carolina League playoffs and after the season was named *Carolina League Manager of the Year*...Managed the Akron Aeros to a record of 75-68 in 2000, just missing the playoffs after forcing a one game playoff at the end of the season before being promoted to Buffalo in 2001...His teams qualified for post-season play in three of his five seasons at the helm...At 35 years and 64 days old on opening day of 2003, Wedge became the youngest Indians manager since Lou Boudreau was named player/manager in 1942 at the age of 24...Also on March 31, 2003 he became the youngest Major League Manager since Texas' Bobby Valentine (35 + 005) on May 17, 1985.

Playing Career

Began his professional career in 1989 after being selected in the 3rd round of the amateur draft by the Boston Red Sox coming off a National Championship at Wichita State...Made his major league debut on October 5, 1991 with Boston and in 1992 he belted all 5 of his major league homers in 27 games for the Red Sox...Was drafted by the Rockies in the November, 1992 expansion draft in the 2nd round and spent most of the 1993 season on the major league disabled list with elbow problems...Appeared in 9 games at catcher for the Rockies during their inaugural season in 1993 before signing back with the Red Sox in 1994. Made it back to the big leagues for the final time with the Red Sox in 1994...Overall he spent parts of 4 seasons in the major leagues and played professionally for 9 seasons...Embarked on his managerial career in 1998 after undergoing eight surgeries over the course his playing career that ended his career after the 1997 season.

Personal/Miscellaneous

Full name **ERIC MICHAEL WEDGE**...Resides in Westlake, OH...Eric and his wife, Kate, have one daughter, Ava Catherine (4/17/2006)... Attended Northrop High School in Ft. Wayne, Indiana and was a member of their state championship baseball team in 1983...Was inducted into the Indiana High School Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January 2007...His parents, Tim and Nina, still reside in Ft. Wayne...Was a first-team All-America catcher at Wichita State University where he was a member of the Shockers' 1989 National Championship team and was finished 2nd to Ben McDonald for college player of the year...Co-owner of Strike One Sports Complex, a 40,000 square ft. indoor sports facility featuring baseball, girls softball and basketball instruction along with leagues and other entertainment in Danvers, MA...Also owns Motivated Sports, a non-profit company that benefits youth in the New England area...He and his wife, Kate, are very active in the Cleveland Community, participating and donating their time at the First Energy Grand Slam Summer Literacy Program, Feed the Need at Cleveland's St. Augustine's Church, the Susan B. Komen Race for the Cure, The Ronald McDonald House, The Multiple Myeloma Research Foundation, The Providence House, The Woman's Center of Greater Cleveland, the Cleveland YWCA & the CIC Celebrity Golf Classic in addition to other charitable endeavors...Kate and the Indians wives are also active with The City Mission.

Managerial/Coaching Career

Is currently in his 6th season on the major league coaching staff...Datz replaced Grady Little on March 20, 2002 after Little was named Manager of the Boston Red Sox on March 11...Served as Bench Coach under Charlie Manuel before moving out to third base when Joel Skinner replaced Manuel...Datz was entering his third season as the organization's Minor League Field Coordinator after being named to the post following the 1999 season...As Field Coordinator, Datz was responsible for the coordination of all workouts and fundamentals of the six minor league clubs in spring training while overseeing the minor league field staffs and rosters of the six affiliates during the regular season...Jeff joined the organization in 1991-92 as an Area Scout in Northern California/Northern Nevada...Scouted the New Jersey area and was a coach at Short-season A Watertown in 1993...Later managed six seasons in the Tribe's minor league system from 1994-99 at Watertown, Columbus, Akron and Buffalo, leading the Buffalo Bisons to the 1998 International League Championship...Datz compiled a minor league managerial record of 403-383 (.513) during his tenure as manager in the Indians organization.

Playing Career

Jeff began his playing career in 1982 after his selection in the 19th round of the June Draft by the Houston Astros...The former catcher played in the Houston organization from 1982-1988, spending the entire 1988 season with the AAA Tucson Toros...Part of Double AA championship winning team at Columbus, GA in 1986 under manager Gary Tuck...Jeff went on to appear in 7 games at the big league level with the Detroit Tigers in 1989, batting .200 (2-10) after spending most of the year at AAA Toledo...In 1990, his final year as a player, Jeff spent the entire season with the Columbus Clippers before joining the Indians organization.

Full name **JEFFREY WILLIAM DATZ**...Married, wife's name is Stacy...Resides in Wadsworth, OH...Jeff attended Clearview High School in Mullica Hill, NJ where he graduated in 1978...Played quarterback and middle linebacker at Clearview and also played basketball and baseball...Was all-conference selection in high school in baseball...Attended Glassboro State College and was a 4-year starter (drafted by Reds in 1981, did not sign) before earning his bachelors degree in Health and Physical Education in 1982...Won NCAA Division III national championship in 1979...Father, Bill, also caught at Glassboro State...Brothers, Dave and Rich, also played at Glassboro State...Was Division III All-America selection in his senior season of 1982...Enjoys spending time with family and hunting in the off-season.

BEST FIRST TWO YEARS FOR A TRIBE MANAGER

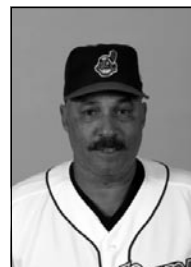

Managerial/Coaching Career

This is Luis' 14th year as a member of the Indians current Major League staff... Named Indians Bullpen Coach on October 11, 1993... Isaac has been in the Cleveland Indians organization as a player, coach, manager and scout since 1965, a span of 43 seasons... Luis was hitting instructor on Charlie Manuel's staff at AAA Colorado Springs and Charlotte in 1992-93... Luis was the Indians Bullpen Coach, prior to coaching at AAA, from July 16, 1987 thru the 1991 season... Became a player/coach at the Tribe's Class A Reno club in 1973 and served in that capacity with several Indians farm clubs thru 1977... Began the '78 season as a coach at AAA Portland... Early in that year was named manager of the Indians Class A Rookie League club in Batavia... Led the Trojans to a 34-38 mark, third place in the Wrigley Division of the NY-Penn League... Named as a coach at AA Chattanooga in 1979... Became a Tribe scout in 1980... Served in that role in addition to his coaching duties with Tribe's rookie league clubs until mid-1987 when he hooked on with Cleveland's major league staff for the first time... Was also bullpen coach from 1988-91.

Playing Career

Signed first professional contract as a catcher with the Pittsburgh Pirates organization in 1962... Joined the Indians organization in 1965 where he was strictly a player until 1972... Was a player/coach in the Indians system from 1973-77... During that span he spent time at Reno, San Antonio, Oklahoma City, San Jose, Williamsport and Toledo.

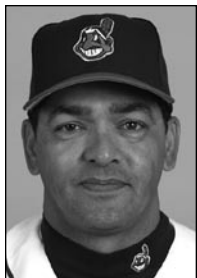

Managerial/Coaching Career

Is currently in his second season as Indians Infield and First Base Coach after being named to the post on November 3, 2005...Luis spent 6 seasons from 2000-05 coaching and managing in the Cleveland Indians Player Development system...Luis managed the Class A Kinston Indians to a record of 76-64 (.543) in 2005, guiding the club to the finals of the Carolina League Championship Series...He managed the A Lake County Captains in 2003-04, winning South Atlantic League Manager of the Year honors in 2003 after the Captains compiled a minor league-best record of 97-43 (.693)...In his 3 seasons as Manager at Kinston and Lake County his teams posted a record of 246-173 (.587)...He was also a coached at Kinston for 3 seasons from 2000-02...Coached in the Arizona Fall League in 2005.

Playing Career

Rivera played parts of 11 seasons and 781 games in the Major Leagues from 1986-98 with Montreal, Boston, New York-NL, Houston & Kansas City...Rivera was a teammate of Eric Wedge's in Boston in 1991 and 1992, recording his finest big league season in '92 with the Red Sox when he hit .258 (107-414) with 22 2B, 3 3B, 8HR & 40RBI in 129 games...He compiled a Major League career average of .233 (516-2215) w/28HR & 209RBI in 781 games...He played professionally for 18 seasons from 1981-98 after signing with the Expos in 1981 at the age of 17.

Managerial/Coaching Career

Is currently in his third season as Indians Hitting Coach after placing Eddie Murray on June 4, 2005...In 2006, his first full season in the position, the Indians scored 870 runs and finished 2nd in Major League Baseball in runs scored...Joined the Indians organization prior to the 2003 season and spent three seasons as the Hitting Coordinator for the entire Indians Player Development System...As Hitting Coordinator he streamlined the entire Indians minor league organization from the Dominican League to Triple A with all new terminology and approach to hitting...Also instituted a two-strike program which recognized hitters in regards to their hitting with two strikes...During his 4-month tenure as big league hitting coach in 2005 the Indians posted a Major League-best .285 (1073-3762) average with 149HR & 576 runs scored (5.3RS/GM) in 108 games, going 68-40 over the span...He assumed an offense that was last in the league in average, runs and on-base % as the club finished 4th in the league in runs scored (790), 5th in batting average (.271), 3rd in on-base % (.334) and 3rd in home runs (207)...The 576 runs scored from June 5th on ranked 3rd in MLB behind Boston and New York-AL...Re-joined the Yankees organization in 1997, serving as a minor league coach for three seasons from 1997 thru 1999...Started coaching in the Gulf Coast League, A Tampa and ended up in AA Norwich before managing three seasons in the New York-AL Player Development System from 2000-02...Managed the Gulf Coast League Yankees in 2000 and 2001 and then at A Staten Island in 2002...Led the Yankees to the GCL league title in 2001 and Staten Island to the New York-Penn League title in 2002 prior to joining the Indians organization...Also led the GCL Yankees to a first place regular season finish in 2000.

Playing Career

Played two seasons in the New York Yankees organization at catcher in 1992 and 1993 after his playing days at Southern Illinois University with a degree in criminal justice...Played at A Oneonta in 1992 and A Greensboro in 1993...Underwent right elbow surgery after the 1993 season that concluded his playing career.

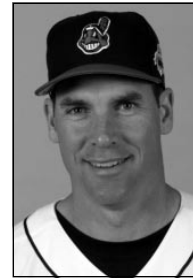

Managerial/Coaching Career

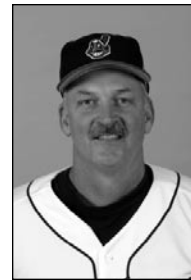
